Graduate Tax Clinic students represent low and moderate income taxpayers in administrative proceedings before the Internal Revenue Service and in the United States Tax Court. Services include helping taxpayers settle and litigate issues such as IRS levies, liens, audits, exams, offers in compromise, installment agreements, EITC issues, forgiveness of debt income and innocent spouse relief. Taxpayers are urged to contact the Graduate Tax Clinic immediately upon receiving an IRS Notice because appointments to determine eligibility must be scheduled well in advance.
